 requested to support the goals outlined in the proposal, and (where applicable) the existence of or plan for other
 funding sources.
- Organizational Capacity to Address Disproportionate Impact and DEI Principles—The organization has capacity to assess and respond to disproportionate impact of civil legal needs on racial/ethnic populations.
